History Lessons, Blessings, and More

History has always been one of my favorite subjects and I used to imagine traveling back in time to see it in the making. But then I realize how spoiled I am with all the modern conveniences, and I change my mind.

However, that doesn't keep me from envisioning what it must have been like,

walking with Jesus or, being part of the making of our beloved Zion's. When I worked for Pastor Andrea, sometimes I would sit in the sanctuary by myself and envision all the souls that have gone before me.

We are coming up on 135 years of history folks! It is a history that is filled with changes and diversity, a history that is filled with ecumenical friendships.

In 2019, I was honored to speak in place of Pastor Andrea, (who had prior engagements) at the dedication of the cornerstone of the Temple Aaron. Some of you know the history.

You see, the connection between Temple Aaron and Zion's Lutheran church began back in 1888. There was a large population of German speaking Lutherans that wanted to start a church; however, they had no building and no minister.

Once a month a German-speaking Presbyterian minister traveled down from Denver and the other weeks, Rabbi Gluck traveled from Las Vegas, NM to conduct worship services, sacraments, burials, etc. He also spoke German. For two years the Rabbi and the Presbyterian minister organized regular meetings, helped to choose the land that Zion's sits on today and met with Mr. Rapp, the same architect who designed Temple Aaron.

They had written to the Missouri Synod for a pastor, but it took time to find one that spoke fluent German. In the meantime, Temple Aaron accepted a permanent Rabbi by the name of Leopold Frudenthal.

The Lutheran pastor arrived and arrangements were made for the cornerstone to be laid for Zion's. Unfortunately, the Lutheran pastor raised a fuss about the Rabbi and his congregation being present for the ceremony and was adamant about not letting them be there.

However, the Fraumeisters (Women's group) stood their ground, and the Lutheran pastor was forced to resign without ever having stepped foot inside the church! The cornerstone was laid with Rabbi Gluck, Rabbi Frudenthal and Temple Aaron's congregation fully present!

It was two more years before Zion's received a permanent pastor so, Rabbi Leopold continued to deliver the Word and Sacrament to the Lutheran people of Zion's. He performed weddings, funerals, baptisms, and Holy Communion. He ministered to the needs of the people of Zion's as well as his own Temple.

An article from the Trinidad Chronicle News, January 30, 2023: In 1939, a celebration of the church's fiftieth anniversary was held, hosted by the Methodist congregation in Trinidad. "Half a century in the life of a pioneer church organization of Trinidad was unreeled to some 200 people gathered at the First Methodist church last night to commemorate with pastor and congregation the golden anniversary of Zion's Lutheran Church. Several pastors representing other churches of Trinidad joined with the worshipers of Zion's and guests to make the occasion a memorable one."

So, as you read about this wonderful history, from the beginning in 1889 to the 50th anniversary in 1939 to the 130th in 2018 to the 135th anniversary this September, I pray you remember the significance and importance of being ecumenical, welcoming all, helping all. This is the teachings of Jesus after all.

Without the Holy Spirit working through her and that one chance phone call with me saying that if she ever needed help that I always wanted to work for a church. That was the new beginning for me.

Through Andrea's faith in me, she showed me that I AM worthy of God's love. She showed me I have a voice and without her kindness, mentorship, and love, I would not know all of you wonderful souls!

So, thank you Andrea. Thank you, Julie, Vicar Lisa, Jo, and Pastor Kate, for all you have given us in love and friendship, indeed, thank you all.

We will keep in touch and think of you often with fondness and love.

Five years ago, Pastor Clay Mason and his wife Mary started "The Way" ministry in Trinidad, serving the underserved – the unhoused, people dealing with addiction, and as Pastor Clay once described "those who our society deems of lesser value." In August 2018, The Way prepared and served their first Sunday lunch in Cimino Park, a routine that has continued (weather permitting, and sometimes when it doesn't) ever since.

Through the years, Pastor Clay and Mary, along with Lana Geier and ACTS, not only feed people in the community, but also work to help people find homes, jobs, and a future. They help get people to court for hearings, take them for addiction rehab, support them with clothing, and assist in many other ways. In the process, they also spread the word of God through both their ministries and their actions.

Pastor Clay presides at weddings and funerals, conducts worship services, has been guest preacher (including at Zion's), and regularly baptizes people often in the waters of the Purgatoire River.

He and Mary work closely with Zion's to manage a warming shelter for the unhoused when temperatures dip into the teens or lower.

When Pastor Clay greeted people at that first lunch in the park, he noted that, "It felt good to once again be in the presence of God and those whom our society deems of lesser value. I saw His face many times today. Many times. And I heard his voice as I listened to the stories of those we have been called to minister too."

Zion's partnership with The Way has included not only the warming shelter, but also making monetary donations as part of our 5th Sunday and God's Work Our Hands (GWOH) offerings as well as collecting coats and other winter clothing to donate.



Zion's has helped with the feeding ministry providing food for the Sunday luncheons.


For Zion's 2023 GWOH project, we will give Pastor Clay and Mary a well-deserved Sunday off. "We will provide and serve the food, lead a short devotional, and administer communion to those who gather at Cimino Park after worship on Sunday, Sept. 10," said Vicar Lisa, noting that sign up sheets are on the table in the Fellowship Hall that give people several options as to how to help.

This is the ten-year anniversary for the GWOH project. It is an opportunity to celebrate who we are as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America -- one church, freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor.

"We know that the gospel changes lives and that God's power and grace are real and at work today. We live out our purpose through worship and service, in our congregations and communities, through our individual vocations and our collective work as church together. God's work Our hands Sunday offers a special opportunity to be church together and to share Jesus' love," according to the ELCA.

"Please use the gifts that God has blessed you with to share in this event," said the vicar. "We know that many hands make light work so please plan on participating if you are able. It is a good opportunity to be a blessing to others. You will see God's face reflected in the faces of others. And you will leave blessed.

ELCA Update Renewed Lutheran Church Commission Begins Work with Summer 2025 Deadline

When the 2022 Church-wide Assembly voted last summer to form the Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church (CRLC) to recommend how to restructure the ELCA's governing process, it reached back four decades for a name.

The original Commission for a New Lutheran Church, which met between 1982 and 1987, was a mammoth research project that held forums across the country, reviewed more than 12,000 letters from Lutheran faithful, and processed responses from synod, district and national conventions of three Lutheran denominations hoping to merge. That work led to the creation of the ELCA. Branding the new commission feels nothing less than epochal.

The current group of 35 rostered ministers and laypeople from across the church will conduct a more condensed version of the original group's investigation, examining "statements of purpose" and "principles of organization" for all three expressions and conducting nationwide research and listening forums.

"Church itself has changed," said Carla Christopher, assistant to the bishop for justice ministries in the Lower Susquehanna Synod. "The people coming to church have changed and the systems necessary to support the work (that) the church is doing have changed."

When the next church-wide assembly convenes, in summer 2025, the CRLC will present its findings and recommend whether the church should mount a special reconstituting convention without delay.



Congregation Aaron Observes 140th Anniversary



The most historic synagogue in the Mountain West (that portion of the country between the Dakotas and the West Coast) sits on South Maple Street, here in Trinidad. Temple Aaron is considered to be one of the most historically significant synagogues in the Mountain West.

Founded in 1883, Congregation Aaron officially observed the anniversary of its founding on July 24, but will celebrate its 140th Anniversary this fall, when the synagogue officially is added to the National Registry of Historic Places.

The congregation built its stately red brick synagogue in 1889, at an approximate cost of \$12,000. The building was designed by the same architects credited with the design of Zion's sanctuary (more about the architects' contribution to Trinidad's houses of worship is

on page 10 of the newsletter.

The synagogue has numerous stained-glass windows in a color scheme of red, blue and yellow, a 200-person, second-floor sanctuary with an elevated wooden bimah (platform in a synagogue from which the Torah and Prophets are read), and an enormous pipe organ on a balcony above the sanctuary.

The building, at 407 South Maple Street, has been recognized as being of tremendous historical importance to the state of Colorado.

Temple Aaron is one of fewer than two dozen original structures that have continuously been synagogues in the U.S. since the 19th century, and the third oldest such structure west of the Mississippi River.

Zion's Lutheran and Temple Aaron have maintained a closely linked relationship throughout their histories, beginning in the late 1880s when Rabbis Gluck and Leopold Freudenthal helped Trinidad's German Lutherans establish Zion's congregation and build the sanctuary. From Our History Books:

Zion's Lutheran & Temple Aaron Share Much History

Zion's Lutheran and Temple Aaron have maintained a close relationship through the years, beginning in the late 1880s when Rabbis Gluck and Leopold Freudenthal helped German Lutherans establish Zion's Lutheran and then when prominent Trinidad architects designed houses of worship for both congregations.

The congregation of Temple Aaron celebrates the 140th anniversary of its founding this year, which also sees its Temple building (photo at right), dedicated in December 1889, added to the National Registry of Historic Places. It



joins several structures in Trinidad, including Zion's Lutheran, which in 2006 received the registry designation.

Both Temple Aaron and Zion's sanctuary are significant as the work of the prominent, albeit short-lived, Trinidad architectural firm of Bulger & Rapp. The partnership, which only lasted from 1888-91, designed four houses of worship, three of which are listed in the National Register. In March 1889, Bulger and Rapp drew up plans for their first religious building in Trinidad — Temple Aaron. It is one of the oldest Jewish temples in the state. The firm received their second commission for Zion's German Lutheran Church (April 1889), which was dedicated February 23, 1890.

Plans for their third church came into being in late 1889. The First Baptist Church, dedicated in 1891, is a Romanesque-inspired sandstone building. The First Baptist Church (aka United Presbyterian Church) was listed in the National Register in 2000. The fourth religious commission was the Congregational Church. This was the firm's smallest church and the only one built of wood. The frame construction with a pedimented gable and gabled hood has undergone moderate alterations. However, it retains enough physical integrity to be a contributing element to Trinidad's historic district.
