A Vicious Cycle

Editor's Note: This beautiful article was submitted by a member of the Zion's congregation. Respecting the privacy of the family featured in this story and to focus upon the important message not the individuals involved, we have changed their names.

I know three people who have died because of alcohol this week alone. That sounds too nice. To be more direct, alcohol killed them because of their own unwillingness to stop drinking. One more person that I know is on the verge of death due to alcohol.

One of the three was only 44. All were deaths of accumulation -- a slow buildup of toxins over many years until finally the organs give out -- liver, kidneys, pancreas and perhaps sepsis and suffocation.

One of these people was my cousin. For this story, I'll call him Carl. He was 51. He was in the hospital for more than a month as his kidneys and then his pancreas failed.

Finally, just hours before he died, he made the decision to be disconnected from life support. That was in early August. When he first went into the hospital it looked like this was going to be the outcome. And I asked for prayers for him at church.

And, I said, keep me in your prayers too. Because I am so angry that he let it get to this point.

He knew he was predisposed.

His grandfather was an alcoholic. His father. His older brother abused alcohol. His uncle. Another male cousin had multiple DUIs and car accidents. I got a DUI in college -- as did another cousin.

If ever the writing was on the wall -- that was the case with Carl. It was baked into our DNA. Not deterministic but a big part of the family story.

Carl has two daughters. We all knew he had a problem. And I for one just kept hoping he would change. Carl used to say he was like my little brother. But, if that was the case, I wasn't a very good older sibling. When I was confronted with the problem, my response was la la la. Please make it go away. It was his life.

But what a waste. He had a Ph.D., learned sign language in high school, and had a loving family. He was incredibly smart. At least in most things.

I think a lot of people know about the effects alcohol can have on the liver, but not so many know about the impact on other organs. Sepsis takes over and fluid starts to accumulate. Eventually the lungs fill with fluid and the person essentially drowns.

My cousin Doug, Carl's brother, died at age 20 while swimming with his friends. He drowned in a river. It's likely that Doug was drunk...that they were all drunk. Their dad eventually died at 65 from non-Hodgkins lymphoma, but he was also an alcoholic.

I started drinking at 14. Coors light.

The dances at the local Catholic Church were known as a good place to get sloppy drunk. And pretty much every weekend someone would use a fake ID to load up on alcohol as we drove around in one friend's old van. It's a miracle that we didn't kill someone or end up dead ourselves. When I got married in my early thirties, we had an open bar. I don't remember much about the night except that I drank a lot.

My spouse's father was an alcoholic...he would get drunk and beat his mom until she was left bleeding on the floor.

It made my spouse understandably nervous when I drank even just a little. I didn't completely stop drinking until decades later when I started taking medication for another disorder.

I had gotten divorced and reunited with my high school sweetheart, the one with whom I drank in high school.

Now they don't drink at all. Neither do I. They had their own epiphany with alcohol after first one stepdad and then another was an alcoholic. The first one emotionally abused them, especially after drinking. The second one refused to stop drinking even when he faced an ultimatum.

That person now is in a hospital bed, organs barely functioning, just waiting to take their last breath.

He will die any day.

So, I ask this: How many more will die before we all stop pretending that drinking too much is funny?

That somehow, it's appropriate to laugh it off, like it's no big deal, instead of saying the truth, which is that alcohol is destroying lives, families, communities and each of us?

How long? Please stop. Now.



Closing note: If you are concerned about a drinking problem for you or a loved one, do not wait. Take action. The problem is likely to get worse, not better. Reach out to your family physician, a counselor, or one of many resources online.

God's Work Our Hands Sunday is Sept. 13



"God's work. Our Hands." is the ELCA annual day of service, this year taking place Sept. 13. It is an opportunity for ELCA congregations to celebrate who we are as a church, engaging in projects and activities that explore our convictions as Lutherans -- that all life in Jesus flows from a living, daring confidence in God's grace.

At Zion's, GWOH is a year-round commitment reflected in our ongoing projects: Through the garage sale, spearheaded by Julie

Wersal, Zion's raised funds to purchase for the soup kitchen the \$2,400 replacement freezer which was delivered there on Aug. 27. GWOH is reflected each month in our 5-Loaves program.

Zion's also has an ongoing GWOH program, coordinated by Terri Watson, for transportation & support for members needing assistance, particularly travel to out-of-town medical appointments. In mid-August, Zion's stepped up to help The Way ministry serve lunch to the unhoused when an ongoing medical condition sidelined Pr. Clay Mason's ability to do so.

In September, Zion's will add two special projects. Both projects begin Sunday, Sept. 13, with a special GWOH worship at Zion's followed either by a sing-along at the Legacy or a gathering in the Fellowship Hall to assemble hygiene kits for the unhoused. Zion's is collecting items to make 30-35 kits (see list below for items that still are needed for the hygiene kits). Please put items in box in the Fellowship Hall.

Basic Hygiene Kit (contents will be put in 1-gallon zipper bags)

- Shampoo
- Body Soap
- Razors (men and women)
- Combs
- Small Deodorant
- Alcohol-free bottles of hand sanitizer
- Band-Aids
- Chapstick

For Feminine Hygiene Kits add small packages of: Tampons, Full-Size & Mini Pads, and Feminine Wipes

First United Methodist Church Bible Study

Pr. Lisa Jo Bezner, at First United Methodist Church Raton & Trinidad, invited Zion's family to join FUMC for a study of Proverbs.

The study continues throughout September. It begins at 6 p.m. on Wednesdays at FUMC in Raton and 6 p.m. Thursdays at FUMC on Broom Street in Trinidad.

Pr. Bezner points to the writings of Theologian Amy Plantinga Pauw, who wrote that Proverbs, while often overlooked, is surprisingly relevant for Christian faith today. It can speak to those who seek meaning and purpose in an uncertain world and encourage us to look for God's presence in human life. Proverbs affirms that true wisdom, whatever its human source, comes from God.

Syllabus:

- Week 1 (Sept. 2-3): Chapters 1-7 – Introduction and the search for wisdom and life.
- Week 2 (Sept. 9-10): Chapters 8-9 – Wisdom at Creation and Woman Wisdom's transformation into Jesus by the early church.
- Week 3 (Sept. 16-17): Chapters 16-17 – Wisdom proverbs and troublesome theology.
- Week 4 (Sept. 23-24): Chapters 16-22:16 – Deeper into the wisdom proverbs with a focus on pride and humility.
- Week 5 (Sept. 30-Oct. 1): Chapters 22:17-31 – Words of the wise, political wisdom and the limits of wisdom.
- Week 6 (Oct. 14-15): (if needed)

Sharing Our Recipes: Shrooms

Ingredients

- 2-3 Pounds Fresh Mushrooms
- 1 Medium Red Onion (cut into 1" pieces)
- 3 Cloves of Elephant Garlic (chopped)
- 1 Tablespoon Black Pepper
- 1 Cup Red Wine
- 1 Can Beef Consommé
- 1 Beef Bullion Cube
- 1/4 Pound of Butter



Directions

- Clean mushrooms and cut off stems
- Bring mushrooms to a boil in 2 Cups of Water and Can of Consommé
- Add Onion, Garlic, Pepper, Butter, Wine, and Bullion Cube
- Cover and Simmer for 2 to 3 hours.

The Fellowship Hall has a new look, as the worn, stained carpet has been replaced with a wood plank floor. The flooring brightens the hall, is easier to keep clean, and eliminates ongoing costs of trying to maintain the old carpet.

The church council studied flooring options throughout the summer, before identifying materials and a budget to make it possible. On Aug. 2, at a special called congregational meeting, members approved the transfer of

funds to cover project costs and by the middle of August John Rygiel and Terri Watson went to work removing the old carpet and moving furniture in preparation for the flooring contractors.

To reduce costs, John Rygiel picked up the flooring materials in Pueblo. By Sunday Aug. 23, the contractors had completed their work, and Pr. Lisa blessed the floor that Sunday, just in time for Zion's to celebrate our new members. The following week, John & Mark returned to the Fellowship Hall to replace baseboards and add other finishing touches.

Zion's Lutheran Church Council

Members present

The regular meeting of the Zion's church council was brought to order at 11:35 a.m. on Aug. 9 by Mike McNeil. All members, except Julie Morris, were present. Julie Wersal joined online.

Opening prayer was offered by Mike McNeil.

Reports

Secretary, Treasurer, Financial Secretary, Trust Fund — All reports were reviewed and approved. Including refunds from Safeway and disposition of extra food they ordered in error. Reports also noted that ACTS has been dissolved. Remaining monies designated for the ACTS mission will be divided among human service non-profits approximately \$375 monthly.

Food Ministry — The August 5-Loaves menu was reviewed. Reviews of additional foods have been positive, especially larger boxed items of cereal and pasta, etc.

Pastor —

- A. Rose Golla, Debbie Spearman, Mark Lara, and Crystal Hulet will be joining Zion's on Aug. 23. The new members' class will be on Aug. 21.
- B. Sept. 6, Zion's will celebrate Creation in Christ Sunday.
- C. Sept. 13 is God's Work Our Hands Sunday. We will have a devotional with communion followed by special projects. One group will sing at the Legacy, another will assemble hygiene kits for the unhoused. Pastor Lisa will contact "Keep Trinidad Safe" to verify needs.
- D. Adult learning will resume Tuesday Sept. 15 at 10:30 a.m. using "What if Jesus was Serious about Prayer".
- E. 5th Sunday Blessing donation for August will be designated for those who lost homes, etc. in the Aspen Fire. Mark will follow up with

Melanie Moss to identify the appropriate entities for donations.

- F. First Call Retreat will be held Oct. 1-3 in Park City, Utah.
- G. Pastor will be out of town the weekend of Oct. 10-11 to attend her sister in law's memorial service in Pennsylvania. John and Charlotte Strecker-Baseler have graciously agreed to fill the pulpit.



Old Business

- A. Flooring schedule is slightly delayed due to Home Depot not having the product available. Pr. Lisa is following up on the special trailer needed to haul products. We will need to be flexible as we move through this time as the work is completed.
- B. Pr. Lisa contract 2026-2027 was reviewed including vacation days. Currently leave days are 19 with four Sundays included. A brief discussion of the Mutual Ministry committee followed. Acting as the Pastor preceptor. The contract was initialed by Pr. Lisa with Mike McNeil acting as signatory for council.

New Business

- A. Council is looking at grants to help with the repair to our historic building as otherwise costs are significant.
- B. Post ACTS of giving monies to Keep Trinidad Safe was discussed.
- C. Council is seeking more information regarding insurance providers. Church Mutual is the current provider.
